

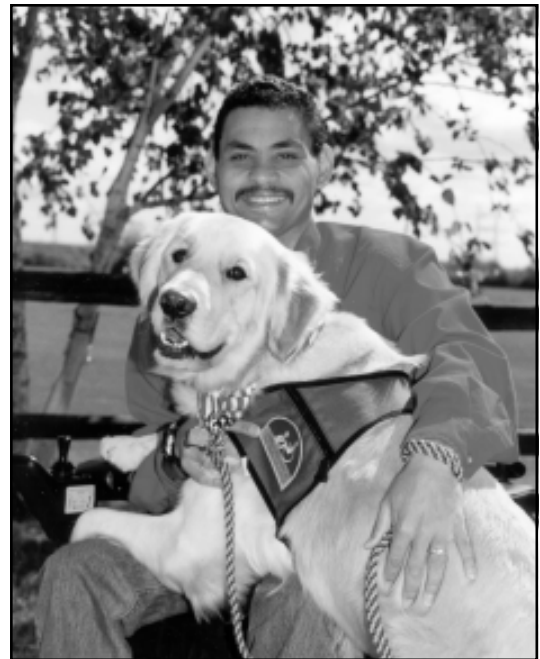


Service Dogs

One category of assistance dog offered by Canine Companions for Independence is the Service Dog. Service Dogs are trained to work with an adult who is disabled but who has the physical ability to work independently with a canine.

The work of Service Dogs is as varied as are the lives of the people with whom the dogs are matched. There are CCI Service Dogs matched with attorneys, legislative assistants, educators, sales people, students, homemakers, retired police officers, and with others in an assortment of professions and lifestyles.

The Service Dog is trained to perform important tasks specifically designed to enhance the independence of its partner. For example, a Service Dog will pull their partner in a manual wheel chair, flip light switches on and off, push buttons for elevators or automatic doors, open refrigerator doors, retrieve dropped objects, and even assist with business transactions by transferring money, receipts, and packages. In addition to the full repertoire of commands each Service Dog knows, the person matched with the dog will often introduce new commands that are specific to their needs.



All of these forms of assistance allow a person with a disability to rely more on a trained canine and less on others as they carry out their daily lives. In this way, the benefits of a Service Dog for an individual with a disability include not only the practical physical aid, but also an overall improvement in quality of life and independence.

About CCI Assistance Dogs

Canine Companions for Independence (CCI) is the oldest and largest non-profit provider of assistance dogs for people with disabilities. Established in 1975, CCI is recognized world wide for the excellence of its dogs and for the quality and longevity of the matches it makes between dogs and people.

All CCI assistance dogs are one of three types of canines: Labrador Retrievers, Golden Retrievers, or a cross of these two breeds. They are selected for their even temperament, desire to please, social nature, and adaptability. Each assistance dog completes a minimum of six months of rigorous training under a professional CCI Instructor and then undergoes a two-week Team Training with their future human partner.

Never aggressive or noisy, CCI's assistance dogs display perfect etiquette in public. There is no need, for example, to worry about "accidents" in public, as their behavior training and repertoire of commands prevent such occurrences. They take their work seriously and are recognized for their high level of training. Each has passed or exceeded the level of training required to earn public access under state and federal laws, including the Americans with Disabilities Act. A certified CCI assistance dog team is readily identified by the special vest worn by the canine and an identification card carried by its human partner.

When not on the job, a CCI assistance dog enjoys its off-duty time just as any other well mannered dog would. Once the working vest is placed on the dog, however, the dog must stay alert to the needs of its partner. For this reason, it is important that others never pet, feed, or distract the dog while it is working. Instead, people should ask permission from the dog's partner to pet it or show it attention. Oftentimes, the team will gladly oblige with a paw-shake.

CCI is supported entirely by the generosity of donors who want to help carry out its mission. As a result of this generosity, we are able to provide these highly trained canines and ongoing follow-up services free of charge to people who seek the assistance and increased independence that a Canine Companion can offer.
